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## TASTING PANEL MORE THAN WORDS

The Society's Tasting Panel is fundamentally unchanged since it first formed in founder Pip Hills's kitchen in Edinburgh in the early 1980s, but more rigorous than ever. Its mission – to assess every sample before it can make it into a Society bottle, to create a name and tasting note and to uphold the Society's mission: to leave no nose upturned.

"It would be a shame to describe such lovely whisky in mere words. Perhaps a pibroch\* would do."

If a literary great such as Hamish Henderson struggled to find the right language to capture the complexity and depth of the whisky in his tasting glass, what hope for us mere mortals?

Hamish was a poet, songwriter, soldier – he personally oversaw the formal surrender of Italy in 1945 – folklorist, co-founder of Edinburgh University's School of Scottish Studies and passionate whisky enthusiast. He was also an acquaintance of SMWS founder Pip Hills, who invited him to participate in an early incarnation of what would become the Society's revered Tasting Panel.

The primary intention was around quality control – with the Panel's main purpose to sample various whiskies before deciding whether they were worthy enough to make it into a green Society bottle and offered up to members. More than that, though, the Tasting Panel set out to actually describe the stuff.

We might take that for granted nowadays, but in the early 1980s the language to talk about whisky barely existed, although an early version of the whisky 'flavour wheel' had recently been created by scientists at Pentlands Research, now The Scotch Whisky Research Institute. At the time, whisky was invariably described only in basic terms of how old it was or where it came from, but with little reference or even interest in its actual flavour.

All that was about to change, with or without Hamish Henderson's input.

Whisky writer Charlie MacLean was an early member of the Tasting Panel and a subsequent long-serving chair. He recalls the Society's groundbreaking role in defining how we discuss whisky and flavour.

"The SMWS was the first organisation to focus on flavour, and really invented a new language to talk about whisky," he says. "The whole point of the Society's single cask bottlings is in their variety, they can be so extraordinarily different, and the Tasting Notes need to reflect that."

Poet and songwriter Robin Laing is another mainstay of the Tasting Panel, having racked up 25 years of sampling whiskies and creating bottle names and tasting notes. He brings his own poetic sensibility to the task.

"People say they can tell my notes because there's an element of humour or wordiness in them," he says. "First and foremost I'm a songwriter and a poet, so I do things with words that other people maybe don't, or bring in odd words or different figures of speech. Words are my living and my craft – although I've also had people ask me, 'Who writes this nonsense?'

"People like Charlie and me are guys of a certain age who grew up in Edinburgh and a lot of time when you are nosing and tasting whiskies, it brings



back childhood memories," says Robin.
"Those memories can be specific, often to
do with medicines that you had as a child, or
Scottish sweeties."

Not all the references are particular to Scotland, however. The Tasting Panel has always been multinational and includes both women and men – so everyone brings their own points of reference to the whiskies. "The main thing is that the Tasting Notes have to be informative, relevant and accurate," says Robin. "But it's also good to have a bit of fun."

Yes, a bit of fun. But a discerning nose and the ability to judge a whisky are key attributes for any panellist, as well as impartiality in their opinions.

"People come in and they don't necessarily know the history of the cask or what project it's a result of, like we do in the Whisky Team," says the Society's head of whisky creation, Euan Campbell. "That gives us a chance to put whiskies in front of other expert noses for their opinion. It also means we can cast our net wide because everyone has different sensory abilities, so we're utilising that across a wider pool of people.

"I think our Tasting Panel is unique in the sense that while we're looking at it from a quality point of view, we also look at it from the point of view of a member sitting in their armchair pouring a dram. So we have this balance between the technical quality factor and the enjoyment factor, which perhaps some other panels don't have as much focus on."

Julien Willems from the Whisky Team coordinates the Tasting Panel and arranges each session and who will be participating in each one from the wider pool.

"Having a multicultural Panel and different experiences brings a lot of wealth into what we can put forward," he says. "Not everything is to everyone's palate, but the Society aims to satisfy the widest number of members across different cultures and around the world."

So whether your Society whisky inspires a poetic flight of the imagination or a pibroch, let's celebrate the work of the Tasting Panel and the outstanding quality of the whiskies they allow to pass under their scrupulous noses and into our bottles.

If you're feeling adventurous, why not set up your own informal Tasting Panel with some friends and try the experience for yourselves? It might just inspire you to some whisky-related poetry – or maybe even a pibroch.

n this а s one. The resulting nose was an island reverie of heather muirburn, smoked kiln rafters, old retired fish boxes, beach barbecues, welly boots and rock pools. On the palate, that smoke was linked with ash, tar, oak, smoked fish, balsamic, chipotle chillies and muscle rub to create a pleasure-enhancing retronasal experience.

The reduced nose delivered harbours, salted caramel and chalk dusters; the palate gave us perfumed garden smoke, liquorice, black pepper, toffee and thyme.

The neat nose suggested to us such appealing things as caramelised ginger, heather ales, buttered pumpernickel bread and salted Dutch liquorice. With time a really deep and potent peat smoke aroma unfurled itself, along with impressions of kerosene, roof pitch, bitumen and exploded first aid kits.

With water we got a campfire topped up with camphor, plus burnt heather, salted honey, smoked meats and fruity chutney sharpened with sherry vinegar - what a riot... what a beast! The palate was alive with raw seawater, petrol, hot and salty chips, green olives bobbing in a sea of dirty martini, pure iodine and industrial-strength mouthwash.

The nose took us simultaneously to a farm shop café and to the orangery, where we found warm rubber boots, a shaved fennel salad topped with rapeseed oil, coffee grounds and cola. The palate was oozing with strawberry, melon, passion fruit and blackberry pie, and offered a touch of mace to a steaming bowl of custard sprinkled with sugared almonds.

Water amplified the custard, added a raspberry slushie and gave coconut on the nose. The palate was now just like the nose, uncanny, but with a spoon of orange marmalade, coconut taffy and ginger. A vocal Panel thoroughly enjoyed this dram.

## A SNAPSHOT INTO TIME

Old whisky is expensive. The first part of that is down to how few bottles there are, and the second part is about the highly-desirable flavours older whisky imparts. But the third and most important part is wrapping your head around how few casks actually go this distance without becoming over-oaked hot messes unworthy of the Society's monogram. When many whiskies hit between five to 19-years old, that's when they'll reach the sweet spot to bottle.

Older whisky isn't necessarily "better" than younger, and I personally love a young distillate-driven whisky, but just take a moment to appreciate just how few casks go this kind of distance, in wood, and not be completely out of balance and still be

a glorious snapshot of another era. It's mindboggling when you think about it.

Then add in the fact that the vast majority of distillate anyone sees out of distillery 30 is ex-sherry, and this one is refill ex-bourbon. The last thing to remember is how long it took for this to get to us. It takes a day to make a vodka, but it took 31 years for this to be ready. What were you doing in April 1993? Now that really lends some perspective...

With a dash of water a wave of fruitiness flooded the soul. Fresh strawberry tarts, raspberry ripple ice cream and tutti frutti danced with joy as they united with slices of charred pineapple, sticky honeycomb and white chocolate. With a rapturous conclusion, mango, melon and grapefruit lifted the spirits with a zingy vitality that gently faded into gentian, crushed chalk and coriander seeds.

Fresh tangerine juice joined an effervescent sparkle in a classic buck's fizz while strawberries and cream were served alongside dark cocoa powder and tobacco. The spicy tingle of padron peppers excited the tongue before stem ginger in honey combined with raisins and a hint of chocolate.

With a drop of water we were transported to the land of make believe as we strolled through orchards of orange blossom, branches loaded with cherries and cedar trees bearing marzipan. Clementines tumbled into our buck's fizz while sherry clouds gathered above. Finally, as hibiscus petals began to blow in the breeze, we broke apart a block of salted orange fudge.

This multidimensional nose ranged from toasted nuts and jamon serrano to chocolate raisins, lavender oil and the smoky dryness of spiced vanilla. We found reassuring sweetness within the intensity of the palate – caramel logs, chocolate hazelnut spread, honey and cherries dipped in dark chocolate; plus white pepper, coffee, fig and eucalyptus.

The reduced nose suggested dark sweetness (dates, brandy snaps, demerara) with lighter fragrances of laurel hedge and orange blossom. On the palate we now found oaty cereal bars with dark chocolate and cranberry pieces, cinnamon, pomegranate, peppercorns and oak.

We imagined joining a barbecue on the beach with an array of shellfish just about ready for us to enjoy. What a choice - prawns, shrimps, crabs and lobsters, as well as scallops and octopus. We however took the roasted skate wing prepared with dried chilli flakes, lemon and vinegar.

Following reduction, we had seared ahi tuna with a sesame crust and wasabi served on a bed of seaweed salad seasoned with sesame oil, vinegar and honey. As the evening became night, we gazed into the starlit sky while snacking on heather honey cashew nuts roasted with sea salt.

Perusing the library shelves, we found a slice of toast among the dusty leather-bound volumes, accompanied by seaweed, rapeseed oil and toffee. To taste, the dram mirrored the nose, with an added side dish of tempura buna-shimeji mushrooms and wasabi peas tossed in coal soot and basil.

Water gave both the nose and palate orange oil, coffee grounds, salted crème caramel and a pinch of peppermint.

A fresh aroma greeted the Panel with the scent of grass, cherries, strawberries and gooseberries, while in the background we noted hints of heather honey and a floral perfume. On the palate, as the nose suggested, this was zingy and fresh, with flavours of grapefruit segments mixed with slices of ripe banana and blackcurrants. In the very pleasant dry finish came bitter chocolate with almond cocoa.

Following reduction we found a freshly brewed nettle tea as well as apple cordial and canned pineapple rings. To taste, ginger snaps and nutty fudge brownies were served with a strong cup of coffee, or a hot chocolate made with cardamom and long pepper.

This complex, slightly understated nose combined lighttouch brush strokes of fruit with impressionistic dabs of chamomile, geranium, cinnamon and white pepper. The palate initially offered fruitiness again; grapefruit, tangerine and toffee apple blending with some subtle aromatics, such as jasmine and bergamot, then finishing with various spice notes, releasing nutmeg, ginger and cumin - but it was gently warming, not hot.

Additional impressions on the reduced nose included garibaldi biscuits, vanilla, coconut and liquorice. On the palate, the toffee sweetness, the aromatics and the spice were all held lovingly together by a fresh oak and liquorice-flavoured lozenge tang and tickle.

## ANEW GUARDIAN

There's a fresh face holding the fort at The Vaults, our spiritual home in Leith where The Scotch Malt Whisky Society was founded in 1983. Give a warm welcome to new manager Joshua Hampshire, who's come all the way from Melbourne, Australia.

Making the pilgrimage to The Vaults in Leith is something every member should tick off their whisky bucket list at some point. By Leith's shore, which was once the heart of Edinburgh's international trade, you'll find an imposing yet familiar building, with a history that goes back to medieval times. You might even recognise it at the heart of the Society's monogram.

Steeped in over 600 years of spirits industry history, the ancient, vaulted cellars still lie below the Members' Room today. The addition of a fourth storey was completed by wine merchants JG Thomson & Co, who leased the building for over 200 years before it became the Society's home in 1983. Through a combination of good fortune and a sense of adventure, founder Pip Hills bought The Vaults in the very first year the Society was born, and we haven't looked back since.

At the start of 2025 The Vaults welcomed in a new manager in Joshua Hampshire, having relocated all the way from Melbourne, Australia. The Vaults will be in safe hands with Josh, with his wealth of experience in fine dining and cocktails.

"My background is mostly around cocktail bars, but quite a lot of the bars I've managed have housed interesting whisky collections," he says. "I'm also someone who enjoys both drinking and talking about whisky. I'm fascinated by the science behind distillation and how different wood types and ageing techniques influence flavour. I'm also interested in distilleries that break the mould or try something different.

"Through my extensive hospitality career I've worked in a variety of different places, and I hope to bring that experience to The Vaults to refresh it, while also honouring its history as the inaugural venue of The Scotch Malt Whisky Society. It's certainly a significant role and the historical value of the venue to the Society and its members is not lost on me. It's a great pleasure to be allowed to safeguard its legacy."

A coastal scene in winter: with reeking lums, saltwatersoaked hessian on freshly laid tarmac, and the scent of applewood-smoked bacon in the air. The palate followed with gusto, serving lollies of beechwood tar, smoked tomato soup, an oily sausage roll and salted popcorn.

Water gave a lighter feel to the nose, revealing hair wax smeared on linen, smoked raspberry jam and lemon zest. The palate finished with smoked blueberry angel delight alongside kippers.

An inviting aroma of figs drizzled with honey and buttery toffee was followed by rum and raisin ice cream with florentines. To taste, we found caramel and vanilla panna cotta sprinkled with roasted hazelnuts and served with a 'Black Forest coffee' - cherry and chocolate liqueur, coffee, whipped cream and green crème de menthe.

Following reduction, sticky toffee popcorn, treacle and maple syrup with aromatic eastern spices danced in the background. There was now a drier mouthfeel, with sweet and spicy notes of traditional mince pies made using shortcrust pastry.

We imagined walking on a sunny afternoon through alpine meadows with snow-capped mountains wherever we looked and, around us, a sea of flowers: yellow gentian, edelweiss, vanilla orchids and alpine crocuses. On the palate a touch of spice, ginger, cinnamon and clove was soon met by the sweetness of lemon honey scones and refreshing strawberry soda.

Following the addition of water the sweet freshness developed as we found ourselves on a porch, on a sunny winter's day, wrapped up in our favourite blanket. As we sat enjoying a mug of hot loose-leaf hibiscus tea we cheekily added a splash of spiced rum from a pewter hipflask.

The Panel immediately noted such things as bandages, ointments, mouthwash, plasters, mercurochrome and all things hospital! Behind that was a beautifully aromatic and brittle smokiness and the salinity of beach pebbles and seawater.

Water brought out a blade of pure, brilliant peat smoke, with lashings of pin-sharp citrus fruits and iodine drops. The palate was full of pure, crystalline peat smoke, with bags of oceanic coastal freshness and character – delivering lots of pure seawater, grapefruit juice and phenol antiseptic. There were still many other medicinal things such as gauze and ointment lurking about. Reduction added some wonderfully big notes of camphor, putty and bandages soaked in more antiseptic.

At first sniff our body language included nodding and smiling – under the influence of vanilla, barley sugars and syrup tarts, lemon, dried pineapple, polished wood and a forest walk. The palate was a pleasing combination of an apricot danish, vanilla custard and orange fondant, with a delicate woody touch of coconut, sweet ginger, eucalyptus and Thai red curry.

Apricot jam, peach melba and lemon meringue pie graced the nose after adding a drop of water, while on the palate the spice held up well and the sweetness turned just a little sharper – conjuring up marmalade, stewed rhubarb, ginger snaps and green apple skins dipped in honey.

A wonderfully zesty and vibrant initial nose was dominated by crushed nettles, tart exotic fruits and impressions of New Zealand sauvignon blanc. This evolved quickly into passion flower, mint julep cocktail and tropical fruit teas. Reduction brought a more floral profile, scented hot-house flowers, runny honey, firm wood-resin notes and still-abundant tropical fruit aromas. The palate was similarly dominated by tropical fruits and showed a gorgeously syrupy texture, full of sweet mango, passion fruit, pineapple and impressions of very old Irish whiskey. Water maintained this superb fruitiness and oiliness of mouthfeel, the overwhelming feeling being of a beautiful balance between wood and distillate having been achieved.

# UNSUNG HERO MILTONDUFF

While high-profile distilleries such as The Glenlivet, Cardhu and The Macallan celebrated their official bi-centenaries last year, Miltonduff's 200th anniversary passed almost unnoticed, in keeping with the distillery's long-standing below-the-radar profile.

Miltonduff distillery – also sometimes Milton Duff – was named after the high-profile local landowning Duff family on whose estate it was constructed by Robert Bain and Andrew Peary, soon after the transformative Excise Act of 1824.

The distillery was subsequently acquired by William Stuart, co-owner of Highland Park, during 1866, and in 1895, Thomas Yool & Co became involved in Miltonduff's ownership, ultimately taking full control.

The plant was extended during the whisky boom of the 1890s, and by the end of the century, Miltonduff was one of the largest whisky producers in the country, capable of making more than one million litres of spirit per year. Most unusually, the distillery practised triple-distillation, very rarely encountered in the Highlands, and most readily associated with Lowland whisky-making operations.

Miltonduff remained in the ownership of the Yool family until 1936 when it was purchased by Canadian distilling giant Hiram Walker Gooderham & Worts, which also acquired Glenburgie, having taken control of the popular Ballantine's blended Scotch brand the previous year. Miltonduff subsequently became part of Hiram Walker's subsidiary George Ballantine & Son.

Hiram Walker had made a great deal of money during Prohibition, 'allowing' its whiskies to be shipped into the USA, and was keen to gain a foothold in the Scotch whisky industry to secure supplies of malt spirit for use in Ballantine's. The company also constructed Dumbarton grain distillery, near Glasgow, during 1938.

### "THE SOCIETY HAS BOTTLED WELL OVER 100 EXCEPTIONAL CASKS OF MILTONDUFF"

Since its acquisition by Hiram Walker, Miltonduff has been at the heart of Ballantine's, which for some years has been the second-best selling blended Scotch in the world, behind Johnnie Walker, retailing 107 million bottles during 2022.

For a time, however, Miltonduff also produced spirit of a different character, as Hiram Walker installed a pair of Lomond stills there during 1964. Those stills, fitted at several of the company's sites, boasted conventional pots, along with perforated plates in the necks, allowing the production of varying spirit styles. At Miltonduff, they were responsible for a variant

named Mosstowie, and the presence of Lomonds was intended to expand the palate of malts available to the company's blenders.

Mosstowie was lighter in body than 'standard' Miltonduff, sweet, gently spicy and grassy, while some batches exhibited soft smoky notes, due to the use of lightly peated barley.

As demand for Ballantine's grew, Miltonduff was almost entirely rebuilt during 1974, when the complement of stills was increased to six, and seven years later, the pair of Lomond stills was decommissioned.

In 1986/87 Allied Lyons plc took over Hiram Walker's distilling interests, and during 2005 Miltonduff was one of the distilleries to come into the possession of Chivas Brothers Ltd, following their purchase of what had by that time become the Allied Domecq Group.

Just as increasing demand for Ballantine's led to the reconstruction and expansion of Miltonduff during the 1970s, so an even more ambitious project to grow capacity was unveiled in 2022.

In the spring of that year, Chivas Brothers announced that it was to spend some £88m in total, doubling potential output at its Aberlour distillery, while Miltonduff's expansion was to include the construction of a new state-of-the-art sustainable distillery next to the existing facility. The distillery, including a bio-plant and evaporator, would add 10m litres of alcohol to the annual production capacity.

Each of Miltonduff's three existing onion-shaped wash stills has a capacity of 22,730 litres, while the trio of spirit stills can hold 18,200 litres.

'House' bottlings of Miltonduff are rare beasts, currently comprising a 24-year-old in the Secret Speyside range, and a 12-year-old cask strength variant in the Distillery Reserve Collection, available only at Chivas Brothers' distillery visitor centres. However, the Society has bottled well over 100 exceptional casks of Miltonduff during its existence, including the outstanding 40-year-old Vaults Collection bottling Cask No. 72.121: All the right steps.

Bunches of fragrant lavender and heather flowers were blackened and sooty with the dark dust from a coal skuttle. Packed beneath we discovered smoked ham, glazed with honey, and grilled peaches arranged beside dairy fudge. Then chillies and ginger chocolate danced around the edge, making way for chunks of barbecued butterscotch.

A little water softened the delivery. Ripe honeydew melons now emerged, wrapped in floral-scented bed sheets. The tongue was caressed by gentle herbal teas, merging chamomile and verbena with smoky lapsang souchong. Hickory-smoked butter finally arrived, spread over charred hot cross buns with a carefree abundance, and served with sweet and spicy roasted peanuts.

We closed our eyes, sat back and relaxed. Freeing our minds in a haze of sandalwood incense, cinnamon spice and fragrant rosewater, we drifted away to a distant world of nectarines, scented earl grey tea, and Turkish delight dipped in dark chocolate.

A sprinkle of sacred water brought further enlightenment in the shape of juicy jelly sweets and bitter lemons. Exotic aromas embraced cumin, caraway seeds and fresh peppermint leaves. A touch of pink Himalayan salt then combined with sweetened butter on popcorn, creating a delicate balance that could be guashed with too much water. Divine fruit juices mingled on the finish, highlighted by fragrant petals and a slice of pink grapefruit skin.



I'm from Australia. The lucky country. The convict paradise. The place where every spider and snake is out to kill you, or at least that's what we tell the tourists...

The middle of each year is our winter back home, where we proudly exclaim: "Now THIS is whisky weather!"

Before getting too wrapped up in this stuff, here's my personal guide on how to pick your first Society bottle to proudly share around with some likeminded guests:

- Look at the flavour profile. Our flavour profiling approach has been carefully developed to make picking the whiskies based off flavour, first. Flavour always comes first. Does Sweet, Fruity & Mellow sound appealing? Maybe Spicy & Sweet?
- Read the tasting notes. Our expert Tasting
   Panel produces these notes every month and is
   meticulous about every cask we bottle. Some
   of the notes will be serious, some jokey, some
   straight-up ridiculous. That's in the fun of whisky,
   it's not meant to be taken too seriously after all.
- Look at the price. We try our best to ensure we release a whole gamut of flavour profiles and price points every month, so we're sure you'll find something that tickles your fancy here. It's always free post, so load up!

Juicy berry fruits opened the doors to a world of sunshine on orange skins and spicy cinnamon mingling with crushed coriander seeds. Silky textures flowed over dried cherries, raisins and currants in crunchy breakfast cereal served alongside coffee with ginger syrup and soft Turkish delight.

Adding water unveiled delightful realms of Portuguese custard tarts, dusted with soft brown sugar and bitter orange peel, joined by brioche and toasted malt loaf. Roasted peaches then merged with wild strawberries as rose-scented Turkish delight returned, combining with honeycomb and coconut water before orange, thyme and pine sap converged on the finish.

Here we have a rarity indeed. A small batch, decades old cognac from our friends at cognac house C5. While the batch does not meet the requirements to be labelled as vintage, the eau de vie was produced in a single year some decades ago. A perfect snapshot in time.

Drawing closer the aromas began to excite the senses, a heady hybrid of fruit and wood. A strong scent of linseed oil recalled memories of polished leather ricocheting off cricket bats in the hot sun of a summer's day. Subtly spiced apple chutney and tarte Tatin meandered with pears poached in rum agricole on a sturdy table of polished Limousin veneer. Green apple and crunchy pear offered a freshness that, when combined with ginger marmalade, honey roast parsnips and sweet tobacco leaf, created a harmonious sense of the divine. Hints of fennel and herbes de Provence whispered in the distance and continued through to a delicious finish of marzipan, walnuts and tingly ginger.

This had a bountiful aroma at first, one chock full of smokelaced flowers, liquorice, smouldering heather, sweeter sherry impressions and singed orange peel. We also found deeper tones of barbecue smoke, coconut shavings, suncream and silky trails of distant peat smoke.

Water brought wet moss, sandalwood, shoreline freshness, wet seaweed and wood-smoked ham. The neat palate balanced sweetness and salinity very evenly, with rich umami broths, charred shellfish, dark chocolate-coated stem ginger, salted caramel and smoked butter. With reduction came seawater, soy sauce, peat embers, cloves, and fragrant wood smoke from a beach bonfire.

An abundantly, almost extravagantly, rich aroma filled the room with the scent of chocolate truffles, rum-soaked raisins, butterscotch sauce and prunes stewed in port wine. The taste was just as luxuriant, with flavours of a Seville orange cake prepared with raw forest honey, which is a little less sweet and has a slightly salty note.

With a drop of water we cracked the crunchy, caramelised crust of an authentic crema Catalan to release the characteristic citrus and cinnamon aromas. On the palate, we cut slices of a cake from Brittany, a Far Breton – a flanstyle egg and milk custard with prunes which reminded one of us of a similar dessert served in the Spanish Cantabria region, Quesada pasiega.
